Basic Disaster Supplies

- Cell phone with charger
- Flashlight with spare batteries
- Battery powered or hand crank radio and NOAA weather radio with tone alert
- Extra batteries, portable or solar charger, 12-volt DC to AC vehicle power inverter
- First aid kit and emergency medical reference materials such as first aid book
- Paper cups, plates, paper towels and plastic utensils
- Top off vehicle fuel tanks
- Whistle to signal for help
- Matches in a waterproof container
- At least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Water (one gallon per person per day for several days for drinking and sanitation)
- Manual can opener.
- Moist towelettes, trash bags, toilet paper, and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Pet food and extra water for your pet(s)
- Prescription medications and glasses
- Infant formula and diapers
- Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- Change of clothing including a long-sleeve shirt, long pants, and sturdy shoes
- Cash or traveler's checks and change
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Local paper maps with evacuation routes

Extended Disaster Supplies

- Generator, gas cans, and extension cords
- Carbon monoxide detector
- Basic tools such as wrenches or pliers to turn off utilities
- Utility knife, duct tape
- Tarps and plastic sheeting
- Work gloves, hammer, and nails for temporary repairs
- Sandbags to combat flooding.
- Fix-A-Flat
- Coolers and frozen gel packs
- Bleach and medicine dropper (Nine parts water to one part bleach can be used as a disinfectant)
- Rain gear and rubber boots
- Fire extinguisher

Warnings Related To Generators

Only operate generators in a well-ventilated area to avoid the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning. NEVER operate a generator in a confined space like a garage.

Store generators and gasoline cans in a well-ventilated area to prevent the buildup of flammable vapors that could lead to a fire or explosion.

Do not overload your generator or your extension cords by running too many appliances. Use heavier gauge extension cords at shorter runs to avoid the risk of fire.
